Longford School

One of my colleagues wrote recently that being a head at this time 'comes with heavy responsibility'; I concur. These are unprecedented times. Education is normally my primary concern, but this has been superseded by the health and well-being of children and staff.

Thanks to the dedication of staff, we have been open since the beginning of this crisis. Looking back over the past few months, my lasting memories will be moments of hope and love.

At the beginning a small number of children came in daily to school, parents sending messages of thanks and treats. We sent home learning packs to the other children, delivered by staff on foot, by bike and car, as well as encouraging the children to work from our online learning buffet. One child, mum working with the ICU team, serenades us daily with Frozen ballads and, wonderfully one day, one of our brilliant and cool Y5 footballers decides to give us an improvised street dance performance in accompaniment.

And then there's our staff families and all the rigmarole of life beyond the school gates, queuing, shopping, cleaning. One member of staff sends messages from isolation; the rest of us are the lucky ones, we have some routine and more importantly company, banter and chat.

A member of staff and former parent came to work one day with mini wooden rainbows for the children to paint and take home to their key worker parents, made by her husband. They looked amazing. This was followed by a super-sized rainbow, now displayed in the main corridor, and a beautiful flower made from recycled metal for our outdoor area of reflection. A few years ago, the same couple gave me a wooden pencil holder, stamped underneath with the words 'Designed and made with pre-loved wood', as a thank you gift for teaching their child.

The cook brings daily joy with hot lunches and then later packed lunches, boxes decorated with an inspirational quote. Staff and children jump about to Joe Wicks. The admin officer kindly delivers lunches on foot and another member of staff distracts the children with gardening, tending the school vegetable patch, planting donated runner beans, melons, sweet peas and courgettes. The good weather and good humour keep us going.

Recently, I have begun to tackle normal tasks, instead of trawling through Government announcements, Dfe links and risk assessments. I do some performance management and talk to a member of staff about her career. She says, 'I am loyal.' I think to myself, not for the first time, how lucky I am to have such a good and dedicated team. I have regular chats with my LA advisor and Chair of Governors, both encouraging and supportive, understanding the enormity of the task bestowed on us.

Thankfully, the situation looks brighter now and we have started to welcome back more children, and to plan excitedly for next year, keen to get back to normal. The sound of chatter and laughter is wonderful.

LOVING OUR COWS, CONSERVING OUR LAND

People often comment on how flavoursome Nunton Farm milk is. It is pretty special - addictive even, but for us producing milk isn't just about the flavour, it's also about stewardship. We feel privileged (most of the time!) to be able to work outside in the open air with precious land and animals, and we keenly feel the weight of responsibility that we hold as a business in looking after them. That's why we consciously work towards making decisions that benefit the lives of the

cows in our care and do our best to look after the environment we live and work in.

We love our cows and so maintaining high animal welfare standards is a huge part of our farming culture. We are a Free Range Dairy, which means that our 800 Friesian cows are outside for 9 months of the year, grazing freely in the pastures. Farming free range milk keeps the cows happy, but also has health benefits for humans; milk from cows that graze is higher in disease-fighting nutrients such as omega-3 fatty acids and vitamins. Happier cows and healthier people, what could be better?! You can read more about Free Range Dairies on FreeRangeDairy.org.

As well as caring for our cows, we are dedicated to conserving the land that we farm. Farming gets a lot of bad press when it comes to greenhouse gases, but farming grassland, as we do in the dairy industry, actually harnesses more carbon dioxide than it releases. We farm grass fields for our cows, but we also maintain natural habitats for a variety of wildlife by planting hedgerows and trees and through the up-keep of our beautiful water meadows. We are a LEAF accredited farm (Linking Environment And Farming), which means that we meet LEAF's rigorous standards of sustainable farming practice (read more at Leafuk.org). Our land is important to us.

If you want to support a local farm which loves its cows and looks after the land, then pick up a bottle. We sell some of our milk in glass bottles through two vending machines. They are open 24/7 and are located outside The Radnor Arms in Nunton and in South Street car park in Wilton. Come and try it for yourself - it really is delicious!

DOROTHY ROBLOU 1922 - 2020

Dorothy died peacefully at home in the early hours of Wednesday 3 June at the age of 97. Dorothy, known to many as Dot or Dotty, was born on 13 September 1922 in Bodenham where she was brought up in the Post Office run by her father and mother. Dot was expected to do her bit, which included getting up at 4.30am to sort the mail and to deliver telegrams to nearby villages, but, how she hated having to cycle to Charlton All Saints.

In 1952 Dot married Jim Roblou who had been brought up at the Yew Tree Inn in Odstock. In 1954 Dot's parents left Bodenham and moved to a brand new semi-detached house in Charlton, the other half was acquired by Jim and Dot – the house was named 'Calvados' and became a very happy home for the young couple.

Dot was someone who enjoyed life to the full, she was gregarious, amusing, excellent company – further afield she and Jim enjoyed travelling abroad soaking up the sunshine and wine of the area. Closer to home they had a wide circle of friends and never missed an opportunity to party – indeed parties at 'Calvados' were always huge fun. Dot's capacity to have fun was legendary and probably without equal. This irrepressible enthusiasm was an inspiration to so many of us. Dot will be really missed by a host of people of all ages and backgrounds.

There will be no shortage of anecdotes about Dot's rich life within our community. She is irreplaceable and we must rejoice that she was such a wonderful player in all our lives for such a very long time. Thanks for everything Dot

ALAN REGINALD FORDER 1935 - 2020

Alan was born at Wrenfield, Nunton on 18 September 1935, at the house built by his grandfather in 1910. Alan grew up there with his parents, Beatrice and Reginald and his sister Jean. His father was a builder and his mother ran a small holding at Wrenfield, keeping pigs, chickens and raising turkeys for Christmas.

These were hard times especially during the war. They had no electricity or mod cons, and endured very hard winters with lots of snow. Jean remembers having fun, despite the cold, sledging with Alan and friends up on Bodenham Plantation.

Tragically when Alan was 17 their Mother sadly died in an accident. Alan was left to care for Jean, alongside tending the animals. Alan commenced his National Service, 4 years later, at 21 and spent some time in Germany. In later years Alan built his bungalow 'Bramleys' alongside Wrenfield, and then married Eileen in 1987. They enjoyed holidays together and watching the wildlife in their garden.

Sadly Eileen died in March 2016 and Alan continued to live at Bramleys alone. Alan had lots of hobbies including photography, genealogy and golf.

His family had a small service at Nunton church and he is buried there with his wife Eileen, and his parents, Reg and Beatrice are close by.

Alan will be sadly missed by his family and friends.

Village Tribute

DOROTHY ROBLOU 1922-2020

Dorothy died peacefully at home in the early hours of Wednesday 3rd June at the age of 97.

Dorothy, known to many as Dot or Dotty, was born on 13th September 1922 in Bodenham where she was brought up in the Post Office run by father and mother. Dot was expected to do her bit which included getting up at 4.30 am to sort the mail and to deliver telegrams to nearby villages but, how she hated having to cycle to Charlton All Saints.

In 1952 Dot married Jim Roblou who had been brought up at the Yew Tree Inn in Odstock. In 1954 Dot's parents left Bodenham and moved to a brand new semidetached house in Charlton the other half was acquired by Jim and Dot – the house was named 'Calvados' and became a very happy home for the young couple.

Many years later following the demise of Dot's parents, in 1975 the other house became the family home of Dot's younger brother, Charles Morrell, his wife Jean and their sons Tony (still in situ), Ian and Peter. Sadly Jim died in 1996, Charles died in 2009 and Jean died in 2018. Harry Marks had been a close and longstanding friend of the Roblou's and following the deaths of Jim and then Harry's wife the friendship and mutual support of Dot and Harry blossomed into much more with the result that in due course Harry became a full resident of 'Calvados' until his death in 2004. Dot experienced much sadness from these losses which was preceded by the inability of the Roblou's to have children of their own. However, Dot always appeared able to overcome these and other challenges and managed to look on the bright side – her glass was always half full (she was known to have two glasses to hand at the same time!).

Dot was someone who enjoyed life to the full, she was gregarious, amusing, excellent company – further afield she and Jim enjoyed travelling abroad soaking up the sunshine and wine of the area. Closer to home they had a wide circle of friends and never missed an opportunity to party – indeed parties at 'Calvados' were always huge fun. Dot's capacity to have fun was legendary and probably without equal. This irrepressible enthusiasm was an inspiration to so many of us. Dot will be really missed by a host of people of all ages and backgrounds.

Dot had been a much loved regular at the Radnor Arms for a very long time. She would talk happily to anyone and everybody – she understood what it is that makes a good pub tick. In her day Dot had a well known and well used soprano voice and was an active member of the Salisbury Amateur Operatic Society for many years. Later on after her serious singing career was no more she was a founder member of the A La Carte Singers which was brilliantly enjoyable fun. Those were such happy times – especially the post performance parties! On top of all that activity Dot was a leading light in village life in Charlton as a member of the PCC, a regular reader of lessons at Church on Sunday morning usually delivered with extra theatrical verve as well as doing her bit and more at all other social gatherings throughout the year.

There will be no shortage of anecdotes about Dot's rich life within our community. She is irreplaceable and we must rejoice that she was such a wonderful player in all our lives for such a very long time. Thanks for everything Dot
