Royal Mail Stamp Extension

Use them or Lose them

We now have until 31 July 2023 to use any non-barcoded everyday stamps before they become worthless. Alternatively, they can be swapped for barcoded versions for free through the Royal Mail scheme. In a U-turn following discontent from customers, Royal Mail has extended the deadline from 31 January for a further six months, recognising that customers needed more time to use up their remaining non-barcoded stamps.

CRESS Christmas Appeal Thank you

A huge thank you to those who supported the CRESS Christmas Transport Appeal. We are delighted to announce that, including Gift Aid, CRESS raised a total of £4235.71.

Some of the money has been sent out already for scheduled maintenance for the new truck pictured above. The rest will be used for the driver's salary, a bicycle, servicing the vehicles, road licenses and more during 2023.

The vehicle has been busy already this year, it took Bishop Joseph to confirm 600 people at the beginning of the January and this week is transporting the team to the two Savings Group Conferences.

CRESS has been nominated as the Chalke Valley Benefice Lent project. There are a number of events planned and more details will be available next month.

Bishop Joseph, who is the Bishop CRESS supports, will be in the UK for the early part of March 2023 and there will be opportunities to meet him and hear him talk. He is inspirational, and it is fascinating to hear how he looks after his South Sudanese people who are mostly living in refugee camps in Northern Uganda. The Lent project is raising funds to support the growing number of savings groups, sponsored by CRESS who will be transforming into agricultural teams as they are trained on how to grow trees and crops. By doing this they are able to become more self sufficient. CRESS strongly believes in teaching them how to look after themselves and being able to educate their families. Please continue to support this amazing charity work.

Odstock, Nunton and Bodenham W.I.

T he first meeting of 2023 on Monday 9 January was well supported. The President wished everyone a Happy New Year and then went on to review club, group and county meetings and events.

Four resolutions had been short listed for the National Federation Annual Meeting in May and these were presented to the meeting. A vote was then taken for the one we, as a WI, wished to support and take forward to the AGM.

After coffee Jackie Worrall, from the Riding for the Disabled Association, Wilton, gave us a brief history of the group. Originally set up in 1942 at Grovely Riding School, to help rehabilitate wounded service men, it now, with the generous support of the Earl and Countess of Pembroke, has a dedicated site of its own at the Pembroke Centre. However £90,000 a year still has to be raised to keep the centre going.

The centre can accommodate over 140 riders a term helped by a team of over 200 volunteers and 16 horses and ponies. Riders range from 3 to 83 years of age and a wide range of disabilities are catered for.

The physical and emotional progress of the clients can be extraordinary and there is now a move to develop and expand the centre's work beyond riding, as the horses themselves can benefit people with a wide range of different needs. Jackie gave examples of how 'Tea with a Pony' has shown amazing results for dementia sufferers as the horses often get a response which can be stimulating but also calming.

There was time for questions before the vote of thanks was given and the meeting closed. The next meeting is on 'A History of Corsetry' on Monday 13 February at 10 am.

Longford Estate

T his time last year the weather had been warmer and drier than normal, the last quarter in stark contrast has been colder and certainly more recently wetter. The Rivers Avon and Ebble have both burst their banks in the middle of January changing the appearance of fields to ponds and lakes.

The farm team worked into the early hours and between the rain to ensure the autumn crops were all drilled, the colder wetter weather combined with the later drilling date has held the crops back in comparison to last year. This year's calves have grown well with some being close in size to their mothers, this is in part due to the bulls that we have selected to breed from and the improving genetics of the herd as a whole.

We have undertaken some scrub clearance on Clearbury Down in an effort to manage the spread of scrub and thorn thereby improving the grass and flower sward, some has been completed in hand and some in conjunction with Wiltshire Wildlife Conservation Volunteers. We also have a large number of sheep grazing Clearbury Down and other grassland on the Estate in an effort to improve the grassland by grazing it in a different manner to how the cattle graze.

In November the height of the river remained high due to the abundance of weed growth during the preceding summer months rather than the volume of water, now the levels are due to water volume. This has made fishing impossible in parts and the rivers are dangerous in terms of flow, depth and debris being carried from banks into the main channel.

The Rainbow Trout at Trafalgar Fisheries have seen some good growth rates within the RAS system and feed conversion by the fish is far superior to that of the old pond system. The RAS is largely unaffected by the recent weather and even the cold spell where fish in pond systems stop feeding. The results we are now seeing prove that we were correct to invest in the RAS system.

The woods team have taken over 550 log orders to date and we are almost at capacity for the season. The higher energy prices we are all now subjected to and the cold spell meant logs were in higher demand earlier in the season than normal. When ground conditions permit we will be starting a large replanting exercise in one of the woods which had been clear felled due to Ash dieback. We will be replanting with a mix of species rather than a monoculture approach which was the norm in years gone by to make harvesting easier however there is now a greater emphasis on disease reduction and habitat creation. The species mix will include Oak Robur, Oak Sessile, Norway Maple, Beech, Sweet Chestnut, Hazel, Hornbeam and Wild Cherry.

The property rental market remains strong and interest in our properties continues to be high. We are in the process of refurbishing a number of properties some of which will come to the market later in the year.

Having been asked a number of times recently about when is our busiest time of year on the Estate is it is fair to say that every day is busy. Different teams have quieter times of the year but across the wider Estate, we will be harvesting something every day from trout at Trafalgar Fisheries, crops or cattle on Longford Farms, trees in the woods, milk at Nunton Dairy or pigs at Allenford Farms.






ENABLING AGRICULTURE

CRESS supports South Sudanese Refugees in Rural Northern Uganda through our delivery partners based in Arua. We have established 62 Savings Groups, 34 of which are trained in sustainable agricultural techniques. We want to raise funds to buy tools so the others can benefit from agricultural training

Most of the refugee community in which CRESS works, lives under the \$2 a day mark. Many families just eat one simple innutritious meal a day of maize meaning they are hungry and poor nutrition leaves them vulnerable to illness. For those in refugee camps, the UN World Food Programme has announced it will have no choice but to make further food ration cuts for refugees which adds to their pressures as does the increase in inflation and climate change in Uganda. So we hope you will help us support them through this project.



WHAT WE HOPE TO DO

CRESS has trained 34 agriculture groups with an average of 25 members per group, together with 76 pastors who were also trained, giving a total of 926 refugee farmers trained in sustainable organic veg and fruit production and small business development up to 2021. Their gardens are flourishing but we can do more.

We hope to fund

tree seedlings

tools training

for 10 more of our 62 Savings Groups.

We want to raise funds so that a savings group of around 25 people can have tools, seeds, training and some fruit tree seedlings. This will enable the members to begin to grow nourishing crops to provide food, security against climate change and eventually produce to sell so they can purchase medicines, school fees and essentials.

Police and Crime Commissioner

Wiltshire Police Crime Commissioner Update Philip Wilkinson



Listening to recent results of how Wiltshire Police officers feel about their job, their morale and general state of mind causes me great concern.

Hearing people's lived experiences are often very, very, different to what you think you know. I talk to our frontline officers regularly and these results aren't surprising given the last six months Wiltshire Police has had – and how policing is regarded generally at the moment.

But we can't just look at one element of these survey results in insolation.

Everything I, and my office, have been working on in the last few months – getting the right person for our next Chief Constable, the police precept and ensuring we have a budget that balances investment with efficiency, increasing performance, looking at strategic leadership and culture issues – is inter-connected with improving morale.

I heard an interesting quote this week: 'Culture eats strategy for breakfast'. And it's so true!

We can have all the strategies, plans, documents we like but if our workplace isn't in a good place, our standards and culture is off balance then we must acknowledge it will have direct impact on those working for the organisation.

Why does this matter? Why aren't we just getting on with policing?

Well, if we have more happy, satisfied, officers out on our streets – if they are staying in their jobs longer than a few years – then this ultimately has a knock-on effect on our communities, on the police service being delivered and it will contribute to Making Wiltshire Safer – the primary goal of both Wiltshire Police and my office.

Someone said this week that policing had been trading on the goodwill of its officers and staff for quite a long time – it is now time to redress that imbalance.

One good area to start would be to tackle pay - I believe police officers deserve to earn a decent salary – and Wiltshire Police deserves to have a fairer slice of the central government pie.

And that's why I will be adding my voice, along with other PCCs, on both of these issues at a national conference in a few weeks' time.

We all know lobbying for change takes time and that is why, in the meantime, I will be focusing on this – and how to tackle the root causes of these worrying results – over the coming months with our current leadership and our incoming new Chief Constable.

It has been a busy start to 2023 for us all.

Internet Security

Fraudsters are pretending to be trustworthy companies Be aware - and if in doubt - Don't do it

Impersonation scams are on the increase. Fraudsters are calling you and pretending to be a business or other trustworthy companies to make their scams seem believable.

They might ask or try to manipulate you into:

- Downloading software onto your computer or phone
- Sharing your bank security codes
- Transferring money out of your accounts because your account is at risk
- Transferring money to one of your existing contacts they'll then try to trick this person into transferring the money into the fraudster's account

Banks and Reputable businesses will never ask you to do any of these things.

Scam calls, texts and emails often seem genuine

Fraudsters can fake our business number so it looks like it is a genuine number calling you. They often sound very convincing and might even know some details about you, your account or how a payment systems work.

They don't only pretend to be a business - they could claim to be someone else you trust, like your internet provider, the police, the council or any other figure of authority.

How to protect yourself

Always be wary of unexpected calls, texts and emails.

If you're asked to, via a text, email or caller, never:

- Download software
- Give control of your computer to someone else
- Transfer money to another account or an existing contact
- Give away your PIN, Online Banking, mobile or any other passcodes
- Click a link in an unexpected email or text including those that seem to be from banks, delivery companies or the NHS

If you get a call, text or email that asks you do something, contact the company using details from a trusted source, like their official website.

Salisbury City Council

A budget statement from the Leaders of Salisbury City Council

 $\label{eq:sterday} Y = \begin{array}{l} \mbox{esterday on Mon 16 Jan 2023 at a meeting of the Full Council, Salisbury City Council agreed a rise in the precept of £102 per year. This means that those who pay Band D tax council will pay £335 per year, and those at Band C will pay £297.78, Band B £260.56 and Band A £223.33. Within the City 60% of properties are Band D and below, with the most numerous band being Band C. Full details of the budget agreed can be seen on the council website https://www.hemmatrict.com Council will pay £335 per year. This means that those who pay Band D tax council will pay £335 per year, and those at Band C will pay £297.78, Band B £260.56 and Band A £223.33. Within the City 60% of properties are Band D and below, with the most numerous band being Band C. Full details of the budget agreed can be seen on the council website https://www.hemmatrict.com C and Band A £223.33.$

Here is a statement issued on behalf of the Leaders of the Council, Cllr Victoria Charleston, Cllr Ian Tomes and Cllr Annie Riddle.

"This is not a party political budget. It is a balanced budget. The city council's reserves cannot be raided. They are already at the minimum level, and must be rebuilt.

Like households and businesses everywhere in this economic crisis, we face hugely increased costs.

Ours include the management of assets such as the Poultry Cross, where insurance will not cover all the repairs found to be needed after last year's car crash, and upgrading our public toilets and playgrounds.

There is a significant increase in our staffing budget because we have taken on grounds and streetscene staff from former Wiltshire Council contractors idVerde, who used to work alongside our own teams. We will no longer have to pay the firm and contribute to its profits. This had all-party support because it will be more efficient and makes longterm financial sense.

In the short term we have to buy vehicles for this team, and because we have chosen to be 'green' they will be dearer than their fossil fuel equivalents.

We will be holding some posts vacant for now to save £70,000.

Since our previous budget in January 2022, we've had an increase of 223% in our electricity charges, 208% on gas and 50% on water and sewerage. Combined, these take our utility bills over half a million pounds.

We've had a nationally agreed pay rise for staff averaging 8%, with another 4% allowed for in the next financial year. Our insurance has more than doubled to £160,000. And we're facing an unknown rise in business rates in April.

We also have to pay higher employers' pension contributions – up from 11.1 to 13.7%.

We are not funding any fancy new projects. We are maintaining much-needed community services such as the Pantry and looking at co-working with a charity to reduce our overheads. We have reduced or cut entirely spending on other things which are not our core responsibility, such as city centre security guards, policing of litter louts, and public art.

We have cut £10,000 from the Neighbourhood Plan budget, reduced spending on floral displays, ringroad cleansing, the Future Salisbury group which promotes the city, and on our Christmas and summer events budget (down 10%).

We have repeatedly invited the Conservatives to share in the council's joint administration but they say they prefer to be in opposition. Nonetheless, we invited them to join us in preparing this budget. They didn't even reply."
