Nursery News

In 2014 Odstock Day Nursery and Preschool opened in the closed village Primary School, (which, incidentally, as a qualified early years teacher I taught in for a few years as a regular supply teacher.)

Nursery Manager, Jessica Angell, was a member of staff right from the beginning. With just a handful of children, including two of my grandchildren, the nursery went from strength to strength, providing care for children aged between 3 months and 4 years. This excellent provision resulted in 'outstanding' Ofsted inspections.

In late 2019 the nursery was bought by Kindred and we are proud to say that, following an Ofsted inspection in November 2022, we have once again been awarded an outstanding judgement. We have also recently been recognised as one of the top 20 nurseries in the South West of England.

We have always taken pride in our child centred ethos, which revolves around respectful care. Our staff are passionate about their work, creating awe and wonder moments linked directly to our children's interests. We are an outside nursery, our garden is a large, exciting and stimulating area split into 4 sections: A large sand area with a beautiful wooden structure for climbing on. A shady, woodland area where the children look for insects and minibeasts, complete with a mud kitchen. An enclosed tennis court where the children can use large loose parts to build structures and finally a front playground and garden where the children can play and grow flowers, fruits and vegetables.

This final term of the year is one of transitions as we support our preschool children and families towards their next exciting adventure of starting school. Some of the children have been with us since they were babies, more than half their lives. We have watched them grow and develop their personalities. It is hard for a 4 year old to fully understand and visualise what's coming next.

To support this transition we focus on independence and social skills. The children learn to dress themselves, take care of their own basic hygiene and use cutlery effectively. They also begin to learn negotiation skills and the importance of listening to others. We avoid terminology such as 'big' school, as one child said "but, I'm just little."

Some words from our parents.

'Our son's independence and confidence within preschool has really stood out to us. The opportunities and learning experiences have really helped with school readiness. The staff are outstanding.'

'We are so happy to have found such an amazing place for our son. The team are very nurturing and provide excellent care to the children. Our son has learned essential skills which has prepared him for reception in September.'

So, as we now approach the end of the Summer term, we're getting ready to send our preschoolers off with a grand graduation ceremony, which is both emotional and wonderful. A real celebration for us all!

Focus on Food

It's all in the pasta

Most people love pasta, students live on it, Italians worship it, athletes thrive on it, so it's great to be introduced to some new varieties. I cooked my first 'spag bol' back in 1974 and since then evolution has been slow, some tagliatelle with a creamy seafood sauce, a little pappardelle with a hare ragout and fussili with courgette, broccoli, peas, spring onion and a wild garlic pesto.

I picked up a copy of Diana Henry's 'Simple' cookbook recently, first published back in 2016, it's a great addition to the bookshelf and you can find it easily enough online. There's a great section dedicated to pasta and so far I've tried two. 'Orzo with lemon and parsley', 'Trofie with courgettes, prawns and chilli.' Diana describes the first one as like Italian penicillin in a bowl, it's comforting, great in front of the telly and takes literally 12 minutes to cook from beginning to end.

Orzo is a pasta that looks like grains of rice, so it's a bit like cooking risotto, but quicker, and like a risotto it's a great vehicle for sitting a piece of baked fish or grilled meat on top of for a filling and fulfilling meal. You can buy Orzo and Trofie in Waitrose, whilst you're there you could pick up some Casarecce and Pennette Rigate to play around with.

The great thing about a pasta dish is that it's really easy to put practically anything together to make a half decent sauce. Even I have invented a couple of my own and that's saying something as I'm a strict recipe man. Of course, for the Italians, pasta is both an art and a science, with each shape of pasta having its own type of sauce and woe betide if you get them mixed up. Here is not the place to go into that kind of detail, but a quick Google tells me there are over 600 varieties.

My Mother-in-law gave me a wonderful Italian cookbook for Christmas last year, 'La Cucina'. The pasta section is over two hundred pages long, it's a 900 page book, traditionally given to brides on their wedding day by their grandmothers. That's how seriously they take 'The Kitchen' down in the land of, well, pasta I suppose.

I had the Orzo with Diana's 'Chicken piccata', page 216. Chicken breast sliced horizontally then bashed flat between two bits of clingfilm. Seared in butter a hot pan then doused with vermouth and basted with lemon juice, capers and chopped parsley, it also takes just a few minutes. Slicing and bashing the chicken is a great dodge, it makes it go a bit further in these budget conscious times.

Plant of the Month

July Gaura -The Bride



July is a month for weddings. You can barely walk through Nunton for fear of being pelted with errant champagne corks. The birds are chirping, love is in the air and there, coming down the aisle to grace us with its presence is Gaura 'The Bride'. Please forgive its wild, slightly unkempt look, wedding planning will do that. Focus instead, on the pinks and whites of its flowers. A magnificent, blousy display that will last well beyond the honeymoon phase, all the way to autumn. There is an exuberance to this plant that can't be denied. If the other flowers are the guests at this summer spectacle, your eye can't help but return to the billowing, bold flower at the centre of it all.



This is the perfect plant for informal herbaceous borders, cottage gardens or naturalistic planting schemes. The way it grows makes it perfect to really fill those gaps in your borders. Ideally it wants fertile, free draining soil and direct sun, Gaura will also put up with poor soil and dappled shade - they say compromise is at the heart of any happy marriage and apparently this bride is really keen to make it work. Most importantly, don't cut back last year's stems until the danger of frost has passed; those branches act as a natural frost protection for the new young shoots.

The most important job this month is deadheading. Roses especially but sweet peas, delphiniums, dahlias, lupins... you get the idea! Make sure you're watering well, sweet peas especially can get very thirsty. Also now's the time to cut lavender for drying. If you must mow I recommend doing so without the grass collecting bag - the mulched grass with act as a feed but more importantly it helps to retain moisture which certainly is in short supply.

Getting to know your community

How long have you lived in Bodenham?

961 days, as of today (coming up to 3 years), still a newbie and think I will be for at least 7 more years.

Why did you choose to move into the village?

They're incredibly important to me and have been my companions for 8 years - Pussy Galore (small tortoiseshell) and Cat Stevens (big boned ginger and white) for those that don't know.

Can you tell us about your early life/childhood?

I was born in the UK but we moved to KL in Malaysia when I was 6 and I grew up there. Early life was a blast, river rafting, hashing (running through the jungle), holidays were nearby in Asia and Australasia, waterparks. I learnt to fly a plane before I drove a car.

What do you do for work?

The challenge haha! And seeing the results. I'm very much behind the scenes and enjoy seeing the 'things' come to fruition and visibly making peoples lives and work easier.

It doesn't sound like much, but in safety critical systems, focusing on the users and designing for them reduces human error (mightily important in nuclear reactors and missile systems), and in the battlespace for example, speed of obtaining pertinent information and decision making is paramount. The MoD and Army Agile way of working side of it helps us get to the digital solutions and implement them faster (less red tape for the sake of red tape).

And finally, what's your favourite snack?

Champagne. Or a martini (the cocktail, not the vermouth).


