Five go to Kenya

Sheri Start, Sally Sutcliffe, Linda Sutcliffe, Marie-Terese Tiernan and Lynn Walworth will be volunteering for 2 weeks at the Matumaini Rehabilitation Centre (MRC) in rural Kenya.

As nurses and special needs providers with a combined working age of 193 years, we have an exciting opportunity to visit and work along side both staff and children at MRC. This centre cares for children and young adults who are disabled and/or orphaned. Stigma surrounding disability is particularly prevalent in rural African communities and there is little education available to change this narrative. Alongside supporting the lives of these disadvantaged children, we hope to create a 'centre of excellence' where nursing skills can be exchanged to combine knowledge and optimise care. With this in mind we will offer refresher training to those from isolated communities who lack support and mentoring.

Our target of £2,000 will provide training equipment, resources and transport for attendees from remote areas. If funds allow we would love to help modernise parts of the centre and establish a sensory room to enhance their lives and make them know that they matter.

Focus on Food

If I'm honest, and the new year is the best place to start with this kind of philosophy, I was never the sharpest knife in the drawer. And a good example of that would be my interpretation of Simon and Garfunkel's 'Scarborough Fair,' from way back when. It's a herby reference so fits in vaguely with the culinary themes my pages attempt to portray.

We all know the words, but not necessarily in the right order to quote Eric Morcombe. This is how I heard them, 'Are you going to Scarborough Fair? Parsley, Sage rows, Mary, and Thyme'. I've been to gardens the world over and seen rows of Parsley, Sage and Thyme, but I could never work out where Mary came into the equation, and always thought it must be some biblical reference, Mary Magdalene, Holy Mary Mother of God, that kind of thing, just because the song is so pretty.

Then of course there are my maths skills, exhibited at early grammar school. The classic dilemma, Mary has three eggs, Steven has four mushrooms. Steven gives Mary three mushrooms..... And of course, I get it immediately, this is a story about Mary and Steven and their preposterous affair, involving kissing, cuddling and culminating in a mushroom omelette. Not much got past me in the late sixties.

These days however, I do have a draw full of very sharp knives, so it's funny how life turns in perfect circles. Actually, I don't keep them in a draw, they hang on magnetic strips, on the wall, easy to see and easy to access. My current favourite, since you ask and I'm happy to recommend, is a German made Wusthof, available online at nisbets.co.uk. They have a full selection, they're reasonably priced, and excellent quality.

My go to is the Gourmet serrated pastry knife 25.4cm, it's a great all-rounder, I use it for practically everything and it's about £80. Then I use their 26.7cm chef knife, it has a beautiful weight and balance and is great for chopping herbs, which we use by the kilo every week when the season is at full tilt. It's great for lots of other things too. It is expensive at £150, but when I'm using it 50 – 60 hours a week, it's worth every penny. Of course, every chef has their own favourite brand and price point. I've always used a Victorinox pastry knife until recently, it does a fantastic job, only costs £30 and you'll use it for a year before needing to sharpen it.

For anyone passionate about knives, as I am, I was given my first one when I joined the scouts aged eleven, there's a fantastic book, funnily enough called 'Knife' by Tim Hayward, 'A love letter to this most covetable of culinary tools.' With magnificent photography, it's an absolutely fascinating delve into the world of both practical and iconic blades. Rush out and get a copy.

Nunton Farm News

B oy have we been busy since we last spoke! What a winter we have had. The cows have been busy making the white stuff that you know and love, the team has grown, new babies are appearing, and more cafes are stocking our milk!

Over the winter months the cows have enjoyed the luxuries of a delightful bed and breakfast (namely, our 520 space cubicle shed)- bookings available for Winter 2024 now open! The dairy team provide an excellent turn down service, whereby the beds are swept clean and topped up with fresh sawdust morning and evening, and all slurry produced by the cows is scraped away into our slurry lagoon. This leaves the cow shed in a great condition for the cows to return to after milking.

Laurence, our tractor driver, feeds 24 Tonnes of silage every day to the milking cows to keep the wolf from the door. As well as the countless other groups of animals! Thankfully, due to the great forage harvest in 2023, we still have plenty of silage to feed to the cows over the next few months.

You may have noticed a few new faces in and around the village! Ryan joined the farm over the Christmas period and has settled in nicely into the dairy team. Annie, our new apprentice has also started in the new year, helping with every job imaginable on the farm from milking to calf rearing, and maybe even delivering milk! Charlotte has returned to the farm after her maternity leave, which has made a big difference to my workload.

Talking of new additions to the farm, since the beginning of February, we've had 160 baby calves (and counting) born on the farm! Most of these will be reared on farm by Alice (our calf rearer) and will join the herd in 2 years time. The freshly calved cows will join the milking group in the aforementioned cubicle shed.

The more observant walkers amongst you may have noticed a new building being constructed beside shelve lane. This is our new maternity unit for the cows, which will provide more space and allow some well earned rest on deep bed straw. They will be able to feast on delicious silage for the two weeks prior to calving.

As the seasons progress and the temperatures begin to rise, the green green grass is beginning to get going! This means it won't be long before our lovely ladies will be galivanting around the pastures. You may have seen dad "walking the grass". As bizarre as this might sound, it doesn't involve trying to secure a dog leash to a tussock of grass, it does in fact, involve walking from field to field measuring the length and maturity of the grass to establish when it can be grazed. This is a vital practice and helps us to manage the supply of grass throughout the grazing season.

Our vending machine and cafe enterprise has continued to grow, with new additions to our cafe round! We now supply the Hub in Broadchalke, Stalls cafe near Fovant and Ginny's dairy on the market square. Emma and Hazel have both been busy whizzing around Wiltshire to keep them all topped up!

To round off last year we were awarded the "South west Dairy Farm of the year" award! We were so proud to have received the award, this wouldn't have been possible without the hard work from the Nunton farm team and the continued support from Longford estate.

That's it from us at Nunton farm! Thanks for taking some time to catch up on the happenings here on the farm.

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

When did you move to Bodenham?

POTLIGHT

We moved into Bodenham in 2006, having spent summer refurbishing the house. We had always hoped to live in a village around Salisbury and were thrilled to discover ONB!

Could you tell us about your life and career?

I joined The Queen's Own Hussars in 1975. I had a varied life serving in Germany, Hong Kong, Cyprus, Northern Ireland and England which involved tanks, Defence IT and multinational programmes. We witnessed both the Iron Curtain and the Berlin Wall collapse. Fascinating times as the Cold War came to an end.

We moved to Wilton in 2001 and I was a key player in the delivery of the Bowman communications which was a £1.2 Bn programme to convert men and machines to the new system. At the time it was a big issue as the whole country seemed to have an opinion on how to do it. In 2005, I received an OBE from Her Majesty, and on being presented the medal in Buckingham Palace, even she had a comment about it! I left the Army in 2010. I then worked at Porton Down running a variety of IT systems for scientists until I stopped paid work in 2021. I have never been busier.

What do you like about living in the Five Villages?

We love living in a village community. We greatly appreciate the friendly people. We enjoy church and community life and I have been fully involved in village activities since arriving.

You run a lot of projects, what are they?

I am Chairman of <u>The Queen's Royal Hussars Museum in Warwick</u>. Two years ago we completed a multimillion-pound rebuild, and now we are at the stage of opening it during the summer months. It is quite a challenge to do this from afar.

I am also Chairman of <u>CRESS</u>. This is an amazing charity which supports refugees in Northern Uganda, and we are in the process of enabling Ugandans to run their own activities through a new NGO. It is our policy to metaphorically teach folk how to fish, not to just provide fish for them. This is working well thanks to the Chalke Valley's generosity.

I'm also Chairman of the Radnor Hall and help with the pantomime and EbbleFest. I am in the process of handing some of this over to fabulous new teams.

Can you tell us something unusual that you have done?

In 2011 I had the great fortune of sailing across the Atlantic in the Jubilee Sailing Trust threemasted schooner, which allows for enabled and disabled people to sail together. I was a buddy to a blind person, which was a fascinating experience.

What hobbies/interests outside of work do you have?

I greatly enjoy our growing family of wonderful grandchildren. If I have a few spare moments then I delve into my past family history; and I recently discovered the joy of designing and laser cutting.



Plant Problems - Solved!

T he good people of the Five Villages (Alys Hunter) called out into the void (last month's N&N), for a saviour of sorts... Some kind of plant-based hero was needed and Monty Don wasn't picking up. So here I am; Mind honed to a dull edge, ready to help. Thank you all, for your questions!

Hello! We have a bay tree with brown spotty leaves - best way to treat it? Thanks in advance!

Hello back! So although bay laurels are fairly tough, there are a few things that can do them in, including having roots that are too wet. Being a Mediterranean plant they like good, free draining soil. If it's in a pot then it's a simple fix - repot with plenty of grit to improve drainage and make sure the pot is on feet. Mulch well and Bob's your ankle, as they say. If it's in the ground and still small then dig it up and add grit into the hole to fix the drainage issue and replant. Then mix up baking soda and washing up liquid and give it a good spray (do this if it's in a pot too!) as this will help deter fungal growth. Failing that, copper fungicides should do the trick and get your bay healthy and happy in no time.

I didn't prune my apple trees at all last year or the espalier ones along the fence... now they are growing like crazy! What shall I do?

So there's good news and bad news here. The good news is you can prune your espaliered apples this year. Towards the end of summer go along and prune back all the long vertical shoots growing off the main stem back to about 5 inches. Leave any fruiting spurs - these are the short stems that the fruit grows on. The bad news is you need to wait until next winter (for both espaliered and standard) for a proper prune. In the meantime, be sure to still remove any dead, diseased or dying branches. Come next winter you can then focus on your standard apple tree. Prune out the branches that crowd the centre of the tree, cut away any that are crossing over or rubbing and remove 2 thirds of the watershoots (the hundreds of vertical branches that they produce!). Leave the branches towards the outside of the tree. Hope that helps. If this doesn't make sense, corner me in the Radnor Arms on a Friday evening where no doubt, after a couple of pints, I'll explain it even more clearly.

My peace lily appears to be ready to be split into multiple lilies. When is the best time to do this and what sort of potting material do they like? Thank you!

The best time to divide peace lilies is during their active growing season, spring or early summer. This helps the newly divided sections take root faster. They are happy with soil that has a good balance of drainage and moisture retention. Standard house plant compost does will for this - I like to add a bit of potting grit as well. Remember to keep the new plants wet while they're growing new roots.

Paula has asked how she trims her orchid's roots without killing the plant.

Hello Paula! As I'm sure you know, the orchid is an epiphyte plant which means it grows on trees in nature! They use their aerial roots to absorb nutrients from the air as well as using them to attach to trees. So put down the shears and step away from the orchid. They need those aerial roots to survive. If your orchid is producing a whole gamut of the things there's a fair chance that its environment isn't humid enough. Consider misting it. The only roots it's safe to remove are ones that are dying. If they've turned brown grab those shears and get busy. Otherwise try to love it despite all it's weird tentacles.

Before my bindweed takes hold and takes over, how can I nip its peskiness in the bud when it starts to appear??!!

If you aren't inclined to dig it all out (and honestly, who is) what you can do is get a dog poo bag (bear with me) and stuff all of the bindweed that is above ground into it (without damaging the stem) and then spray into the bag with a systemic weedkiller, being careful to not spray anything else. Then tie the bag off and leave the accursed plant to its fate!



Police and Crime Commissioner

PCC Philip Wilkinson's March Parish Column



A fter a period of public consultation, I presented my final proposal for the policing precept of your council tax to the Police and Crime Panel this month.

Wiltshire Police is facing increased financial pressures as we strive to deliver the necessary service improvements required, which led to the panel supporting my decision to increase the precept by 5.2%, an extra £1.09 a month or £13 a year for the average Band D property.

This, alongside a grant from the government, accounts for the core budget for policing in the county.

The decision to increase the precept has been a difficult but necessary one. I am listening to residents when they tell me that they want a better and improved service from both the police and wider criminal justice system with improved outcomes and more visibility.

The public voted in favour of the rise, with 85% of respondents to my recent Policing, Priorities and ££s survey saying they wanted to see more investment in policing.

Whilst key improvements have been delivered over past 12 months, including a fourfold improvement in positive outcomes for Rape and Serious Sexual Offences and Wiltshire Police becoming one of the top performing forces nationally in disrupting county lines per head in capita, there is still much to do to make Wiltshire safer as crime and policing demand becomes ever more complex.

Even by putting the precept up by £13 a year, we still need to make savings of £2.4m to cover the funding gap. We remain one of the worst funded force areas in the country, but I will continue to lobby the government for fairer funding.

Both the Chief Constable and I are committed to delivering a policing service which meets an ever-changing crime picture and is fit for the future.

I am confident that with this increase we can continue to invest in key areas to maintain the improvements that we are now seeing across the board.

Applications for funding were considered by the OPCC panel in January, with applications still be accepted on a rolling basis for next quarter's decision-making panel.

PCC Philip Wilkinson said: "I'm pleased with the number of applications we've received in this window of funding and the standard of those applications has been very high.

"I'd like to thank every group for their interest in my Community Action Fund and for the great work they all do whether that be protecting young or vulnerable people, offering diversionary activities and pathways or providing a space within communities.

"I'm looking forward to seeing these projects develop and visiting as many of the groups as I can to see their great work in action, how they are actively contributing to their communities and helping to making Wiltshire safer by delivering the priorities in my Police and Crime Plan."

Arya Smith, aged nine, from Wilton, tried out the games on the VR headset when she was in hospital. She said the games were "cool" adding: "It's fun playing the games."

Her mum Lorna said: "It's great to have something like this, which can be taken to their bedside. It gives them something to keep their minds busy while they are in hospital. Thank you very much to all the Stars Appeal supporters for making Arya's stay more pleasant."
