Community Speed Watch




T he Community Speed Watch (CSW) team has been active for several years and continues to hold sessions to monitor the speed of drivers passing through the village. Any vehicles traveling in excess of 35mph are reported to Wiltshire Police who take appropriate enforcement action.

We aim to hold morning and afternoon sessions for 40mins on consecutive days for one week each month. When we first started it was not unusual to record and report up to 10 speeding vehicles per day and I'm pleased to report that in recent months we have rarely recorded more than 5 speeding vehicles per day so hopefully we are having some impact.

We are very grateful to members of the community who offer their support for the work that we do and thankfully we do not receive too much abuse from drivers irritated by our presence.

We are a small group and would welcome offers of support from anyone who would like to be involved. Most members of the group only commit a few hours each month and enjoy the opportunity to meet and chat while being involved in community activity. A past speeding conviction is no barrier to recruitment, most of us will admit to at least one offense, although of course not in the villages!





The Speed Indicator device

This was purchased by the Parish Council has now been deployed at various sites in the villages over the past couple of years. It records the speed of all vehicles passing in both directions and although it does not record vehicle details, it does give an indication of the scale of the problem of speeding through our community.

This pie chart shows that the majority of drivers do keep to the speed limit and these numbers are in keeping with the results recorded by the CSW team. However a small proportion of drivers still drive dangerously fast through the villages. The results are shared with Wiltshire Police and compared to other communities using this technology and it may surprise readers to learn that our results are some of the best recorded in the South Wilts area.

Focus on Food

They must be impromptu, or they don't work. Shocking but fun, wrong in a funny way, but oh so right. We're talking 'food fight', not for the feint hearted.

It was November 1976, my 22nd birthday, I was living in a big old house off Brixton Hill with a bunch of recently graduated art students. One of those properties the council were about to gut and do up, but didn't have the money, so they bribed students to come in at reduced rents to keep the squatters out.

Jimmy and I had embarked on our first venture post-graduation, The Aztec Building Company, 'watch it come down' was our catch phrase. We were working, renovating a five-story house in Pimlico which belonged to a friend of a friend. Come six or clock, birthday or not, it was time for a beer. We headed off to a favorite haunt, The Star in Belgrave Square, where they served the finest pint of Fuller's ESB.

Our communal household were always advocates of the surprise party, birthday or otherwise and we'd had a few over the years, so I assumed that our outing to The Star was a warmup for the ensuing festivities. ESB is the strength of Carlsberg Special Brew, albeit in more refined packaging, so by the time we're onto our third, I'm starting to wonder whether there is a party looming at the end of our session.

I'm thinking, if we have another one, there's definitely nothing to go back to except an early night in a cosy bed. We had two, so we're five pints in when we arrive back at Fairmount Road and are ushered into the 'dining room'. The theme is Children's Tea Party and the guests are dressed in a weird mash up of St Trinians meets The Vauxhall Tavern, so four years at art school not gone to waste.

The table setting was pure artistry, towers of cream cakes, sandwiches, jellies, with savoury offerings of spaghetti Bolognese and baguettes of garlic bread. Everyone was smiling, jovial, excited to be there, to be celebrating with me. Flowers adorned the table setting, wine and conversation flowed. Suddenly it all fell into place, I was being set up and about to be clouted with clafoutis, battered with bread and bruised with a Bolognese sauce. Quick witted as I am, and without sin, I cast the first stone, well cream cake, straight into the face of Georgina who sat next to me, at which point the room and its contents erupted into something resembling Vesuvius going off in Pompei.

The following morning, well afternoon really, we emerged and stumbled back down into the dining room to survey the scene. The devastation, the absolute carnage. Around the walls, were visibly recognisable silhouettes of the people who had sat there the night before. A titter was forming inside of me until Georgina, face like thunder, started to sob. She and a few friends had spent upwards of 10 hours preparing the food and the decorations and it was never meant to end that way. Naturally I was devastated, but the joy lives with me to this day.

Ella, our youngest daughter, when asked what she wanted for her eighth birthday party, weirdly didn't say 'Chicken and Broccoli' but 'A food fight', to which we naturally acquiesced. She had a dozen or so friends round, collaborated with a few, but not the majority who anticipated nothing about the upcoming proceedings. The pictures from the event are priceless. Half the girls are squealing with delight at the sheer fun they are having, with the other half absolutely traumatised with guilt at the carnage that had been rent on a civilised household.





hat do you enjoy most about running the studio?
The joy of witnessing a community build over the years. Friendships have been made and it means that someone will always meet or recognise a person they know or vaguely know. We have people from many different professions attending the various sessions so afterwards, there is a lot of useful knowledge exchanged on a myriad of topics from gardening to health tips, triathlons to writing and much more.

What is it about yoga that you love, in your own practice?

Yoga is a way of life for me and over the years I have grown in knowledge and awareness about what this entails. The physical practice, although important, is only one aspect of the 8 limbs of yoga. I continue to study and I am currently undertaking a Yoga Philosophy one year course in London which includes learning Sanskrit and this is beyond challenging!

You also offer Gong Baths, what are these and what are the benefits?

In brief, a gong bath affords the opportunity to lie down and be immersed in the vibrations of the gongs and other instruments during the one hour session. It is very restorative and the vibrations of the various gongs encourage the brain towards deep relaxation - specifically delta and theta waves which are the slowest brain waves in humans and usually accessed during daydreaming or deep sleep. They are known to aid calmness, creativity and natural healing. Many people say they get the best night of sleep after a gong bath.



Getting to know your community

Dr Alys Hunter

How long have you lived in the community?

We've lived in Nunton nearly 5 years! When we decided to leave Portsmouth, we looked for a home where we could live with my parents on site, and also somewhere that was in the middle of the Wessex Deanery (doctors can be sent to lots of different hospitals during post-

graduate training). We looked at so many houses, but the Goldilocks house was the one we are living in today. We fell in love with the area; and being within walking distance of the park and the pub was perfect!



Either "Wing Commander" or "Dr". In terms of what I do "Consultant in Acute and General Medicine with a Special Interest in Dermatology and Telemed Air", which doesn't really roll off the tongue!

Can you explain your job in more detail?

I'm really lucky to have a portfolio career! In Salisbury, I do NHS work at Salisbury District Hospital, and I look after unselected adult patients (anyone over 18, some over 16) with any condition that isn't surgical, trauma or obstetric. In the morning, I review patients who have come in overnight on the ward round, make decisions about tests and investigations they need, and decide what needs to happen before they are well enough to go home. Usually we'll have a team meeting; we might discuss governance, learning opportunities, projects that the team are working on. From August, when our new doctors come to the hospital, I will be an Educational Supervisor for some of them, which is a massive privilege. In Southampton, I work as part of the Dermatology team. I see both children and adult patients, and do a mixture of clinics and skin surgery. I also do a Military clinic once or twice a month, and give advice to military medical colleagues at home and overseas. Telemedicine is a really important part of the military medicine service; part of my role is to moderate advice requests and help deployed doctors make referrals to the right teams with the right information.

Why/how did you choose this career path?

I knew I wanted to be a doctor from age 9, and from then on, I devoted everything to getting to medical school. I graduated in 2009, and I still find medicine fascinating. I joined the RAF in 2002, not long before going to university. I loved Star Trek as a child, and since I couldn't be a doctor on the USS Enterprise, I joined the RAF instead. I've had some amazing adventures, and I love the fact that there are always new opportunities in the military.

What's the most unusual case you've had?

Medicine is full of bizarre moments! I can't talk about specific cases, but highlights have included prescribing ready salted crisps (and filling the drug cupboard with packets!), managing acute chest pain at 30,000 feet, getting pulled off a ward round to fly to New York, and turning 40 on my last ever night shift at 00.01hrs on Christmas morning.

What is something you do in your job that we wouldn't expect?

I tell quite a lot of jokes – nothing like starting a ward round with a joke!

Ebble Water Quality Monitoring

A cross the country in the past couple of years there has been a growing realization that many of our rivers have become seriously polluted and a hazard to health. A small group of local residents concerned about the water quality in our local river have begun a program of regular monitoring for evidence of pollution of the Ebble.

The River Ebble has an excellent reputation as a pristine chalk stream and we would like it to remain that way. The river is monitored by the Environment Agency but experience elsewhere has shown that this has not stopped the degradation of river water quality.

We are part of a much larger voluntary group working throughout the River Avon catchment area who are pooling results to analyze the extent of the problem and if possible identify where the pollution is arising from so that hopefully preventative action can be taken before irreversible damage is done.



We have carried out our first few testing sessions at Jubilee Gardens and the results so far are encouraging. There is evidence of raised levels of nitrate, phosphate and ammonia so the Ebble can no longer be described as a pristine chalk stream but the levels we have recorded do not cause undue concern. We will continue with a weekly testing session and report periodically to News & Notes.

We are not currently testing for E.coli, but obviously this is a concern when children play in the river water and particularly at the annual raft race. We plan to include this in our work in future.

We are only a small group and none of us has any professional training in Environmental Science although we are supervised by qualified environmentalists. We would welcome new recruits who would like to be involved and share in the work and particularly any younger members of the community interested perhaps in a career in environmental science.

The charity has grown and developed, liaises with other organizations, and has plans for the future but always the aim is to help the youth and families of Bemerton Heath.

Dr Alys Hunter

How long have you lived in the community?

We've lived in Nunton nearly 5 years! When we decided to leave Portsmouth, we looked for a home where we could live with my parents on site, and also somewhere that was in the middle of the Wessex Deanery (doctors can be sent to lots of different hospitals during post-graduate training). We looked at so many houses, but the Goldilocks house was the one we are living in today. We fell in love with the area; and being within walking distance of the park and the pub was perfect!

What's your job title?

Either "Wing Commander" or "Dr". In terms of what I do "Consultant in Acute and General Medicine with a Special Interest in Dermatology and Telemed Air", which doesn't really roll off the tongue!

Can you sum up your job in 3 words?

Fix sick people!

Can you explain your job in more detail?

I'm really lucky to have a portfolio career! In Salisbury, I do NHS work at Salisbury District Hospital, and I look after unselected adult patients (anyone over 18, some over 16) with any condition that isn't surgical, trauma or obstetric. In the morning, I review patients who have come in overnight on the ward round, make decisions about tests and investigations they need, and decide what needs to happen before they are well enough to go home. Usually we'll have a team meeting; we might discuss governance, learning opportunities, projects that the team are working on. In August, when our new doctors come to the hospital, I will be an Educational Supervisor for some of them, which is a massive privilege. In Southampton, I work as part of the Dermatology team. I see both children and adult patients, and do a mixture of clinics and skin surgery. I also do a Military clinic once or twice a month, and give advice to military medical colleagues at home and overseas. Telemedicine is a really important part of the military medicine service; part of my role is to moderate advice requests and help deployed doctors make referrals to the right teams with the right information.

Why/how did you choose this career path?

I knew I wanted to be a doctor from age 9, and from then on, I devoted everything to getting to medical school. I graduated in 2009, and I still find medicine fascinating. I joined the RAF in 2002, not long before going to university. I loved Star Trek as a child, and since I couldn't be a doctor on the USS Enterprise, I joined the RAF instead. I've had some amazing adventures, and I love the fact that there are always new opportunities in the military.


Getting to know your community— continued

What's the most unusual case/moment you've had?

Medicine is full of bizarre moments! I can't talk about specific cases, but highlights have included prescribing ready salted crisps (and filling the drug cupboard with packets!), managing acute chest pain at 30,000

feet, getting pulled off a ward round to fly to New York, and turning 40 on my last ever night shift at 00.01hrs on Christmas morning.



Common sense, an understanding of what people's lives are like and an ability to manage expectations. I can prescribe all the expensive treatments in the world, but they won't work if the patient can't use them. Intellectual curiosity and a willingness to teach and learn are really important.

What is something you do in your job that we wouldn't expect?

I tell quite a lot of jokes – nothing like starting a ward round with a joke!

What's the dullest part?

Electronic prescribing...

What's the most exciting part?

Managing people who are really unwell, working through their problems and making them better. Sepsis is a great example – when the blood pressure normalises, the heart rate slows down and the fever breaks, you feel like Dr House.

If you weren't in your line of work what else would you do?

I really enjoy writing – I think some sort of journalism.

What do you do outside of work?

I run, go to the gym, chase my children around, help out with the village panto, admire the beautiful Nunton scenery and try to find time to paint and sew.

In the event of a zombie apocalypse, would your house be a good one to come to? This very much depends on the subtype of zombie. I think we'd be fine against slow zombies – we could shut the gates and pick them off from the bathroom windows. But my preferred option is to annex Waitrose...

Police Crime Commissioner Report

First draft of new Police and Crime Plan in development following public consultation



PCC Philip Wilkinson's Police and Crime Plan – a blueprint for the strategic policing and crime priorities for the next three years – is now being drafted following an extensive public consultation, including public engagements and youth representation.

Launched in July for a period of 4 weeks, the Use Your Voice survey enabled residents of Wiltshire and Swindon to have their say on different aspects of policing, including which areas of policing are most important to them, their perception of crime rates over the past three years and how they think Wiltshire Police could improve the service it provides.

This feedback is now being analysed as the first draft of the new police and Crime Plan is being produced, ahead of being made available for residents' feedback. Mr. Wilkinson said: "With development starting on my Police and Crime Plan 2024-2028, we are working to incorporate national priorities, inspectorate requirements and advice from the Chief Constable – as well as the invaluable from Wiltshire and Swindon's residents.

"I will ensure the new plan is streamlined and provides strategic direction and framework, greater clarity on success and performance, and how I want to strengthen our response areas that have emerged nationally and locally such as rural crime and retail crime.

"Just last week, the HMICFRS Police Effectiveness, Efficiency and Legitimacy (PEEL) report highlighted the improvements made since 2022. However, there is still much work to be done in some key areas across the Force – and I will ensure my updated Police and Crime Plan will enable Wiltshire Police to further deliver those improvements needed."

The first draft of the new Police and Crime Plan will be published at the end of September, with all public feedback to be submitted via a form on our website.

The PCC will also be taking the draft to numerous events and stakeholder groups including the Community Safety Partnerships and Wiltshire Criminal Justice Board before the final draft is presented to the Police and Crime Panel in November.
