

Longford Estates

A glorious summer if you weren't trying to grow crops or rear pasture-based livestock and to date a kind autumn both of which have been advantageous to much or our work across the Estate.

The beef herd started calving in April and with the warm dry weather it was a relatively easy calving period, calves didn't get cold and/or wet so were soon on their feet suckling and thriving. The challenge came in July and August when the grass wasn't growing and we had to start feeding winter feed to ensure the cows had enough nutrition to maintain their condition and to keep suckling hungry calves.

The crops benefitted from a much-reduced disease pressure as a result of the hot dry weather but the lack of rain meant that the ears on the cereal crops and the pods on the peas and oilseed rape didn't fill as we would have liked. Harvest was a mixed bag, some of the early drilled wheats performed really well but those that we had struggled to get in late last autumn didn't perform. The autumn has been kind and the winter drilling is all complete, which puts us at a distinct advantage in comparison to last year. A reduced sheep flock is grazing the pastures and downland, the reduced numbers as a result of reduced grass availability. The impact the flock has had over the past few years is evident in terms of grass and weed populations later in the season.

The old adage of 'up horn, down corn' couldn't be more evident this year. The grain market is at its lowest point in years whilst the beef and sheep trade is as strong as it has been, the importance of having a mixed farming enterprise to spread the risk is clearly evident.

The lack of rain has put real pressure on the river water levels but this has given us opportunity to do various works along the riverbanks to the benefit of the river, the banks and for our fishing syndicates. The trout fishing has been tremendous this year with some fantastic wild fish being caught along with stocked fish as well.

The forestry team had a busy summer weeding and brashing through our woodlands as well as clear felling one site and a major thinning operation on another principally due to Ash Dieback. Much of the wood will be used to supply Longford Logs over the next few seasons, log deliveries are well underway now and our new work site has proved to be a great success for the team. Logs are available to order through our website.

A good number of cricket bat willow trees have been harvested this year going to several bat makers, we are fortunate that we are able to produce some quality willow which the bat makers are keen to work with.

The maintenance team spent many months focused on refurbishing The Green Dragon pub in Alderbury and we were delighted to re-open the pub in early August and to welcome customers new and old to the new look pub. The Estate teams along with a raft of contractors have done an incredible job in rejuvenating the pub and its gardens. A number of regular themed nights are planned including a quiz night, 'steak & a pint night'. If you haven't been to see The Green Dragon for a while it is certainly worth booking a table for a meal out.

Focus on Food - letter from West Wales

The Retreat - food to soothe a troubled mind

've just spent two weeks cooking at a writing retreat in an Old Rectory on the coast of Pembrokeshire, above Newport sands. Supper on Sunday evening when guests arrived, then Breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea and supper, Monday through Thursday, with a final breakfast on the Friday morning and a fond farewell to follow.

The kitchen looked out across the bay and out over the Irish sea, with a view that swooped back on to the wide, welcoming sands, over the dunes and up the estuary of the river Nevern. It was blasted by storms for the first week with prancing, galloping white horses racing each other in a lather across the tops of waves, the wind howling and chasing them onto the beach, the finish line.

The sky growled and showed its colours, violet and orange with silver shafts of sunlight lancing through them like earth rods, piercing the ground below. A double rainbow, biblical rain, a show of true nature, by nature, performed, so it seemed for my benefit only. A spectator at the theatre, in the gods, on the side of Carningli, the 'Mountain of Angels', high above the coast and sea below.

The second week, which saw a second group of writers descend, was calm blue, cerulean, with blinding sunshine basking over all the land. A contemplative haze, a still photograph or a still from a movie made long ago, 'How Green Was My Valley' perhaps, or The Railway Children', something nostalgic, calming, surreal.

Talking of calming and surreal, the guests were there for writing, meditation, yoga and cold-water swimming. There was silence between the hours of 9pm and noon the next day. So breakfast was a challenge, finding out who wanted porridge, or toast, or eggs, poached, boiled or scrambled.

Some people had come from Seattle, Boston, New York, some from London, Bristol, Sheffield. All brought their ideas and inspiration, packed inside their heads, with the contents spilling out in notes, sentences and unformed paragraphs onto the pages of their notebooks. Each brought their back stories, their nerves, gentle traumas and a spark with which to ignite them and share with others. Their quiet passion, brimming to overflowing as the opportunity to read to and listen to their fellow writer's stories emerged, their truths or imaginings which all come from the truths deep within us, the mines where the canaries sing, or don't if the air is too toxic.

Passionate about the stories they wanted to write, they seemed oblivious to the stories they themselves had already become. Poetic, whimsical, dark, adventurous, philosophical. They arrived as a work in progress, with a work in progress in their heads, constantly overlapping, ebbing and flowing between fantasy and reality, fiction and fact. In a way they are more escapees than retreatants. Escaping their regular lives, into this small brief community, a brief encounter with like-minded people and into the safety their companionship offers. Escaping the torment, who know, even torture of friends and family who often ridicule creatives and their early fumbling creative efforts.

And I, a fly on the wall, invisible in the kitchen, sensing the mood each different day brought as the writers got to know each other, relaxed into themselves, found commonality and even discovered mutual friends in those far away cities, even on first meeting, quite bizarre.

I thought I was invisible, detached in my kitchen, with my recipes and spreadsheets and charts. Chopping and slicing local leeks, sauteing them in liberal quantities of butter and thyme until they change texture and become velvet in the pan. Adding the risotto rice, stirring and adding the wine, then the stock, constantly stirring to encourage the rice to slowly cook, slowly soften. Then served with chestnuts, pan fried in butter and thyme, salt and pepper, scattered across the top of the risotto, with flecks of micro red basil to lift the dish visually. I thought I was unseen doing all this, different dishes throughout the day, different every day, nourishing, sustaining. Until, handing this dish to one of the writers and informing him what it was, he took it from me quietly, but with a look in his eye. It was a dish his great friend used to cook for him often, when they shared a flat together many years ago, before he left to go and live in Southern Europe, a friend he hadn't seen now for a long time. I handed him the recipe to make sure it was the same one, at which point he crumpled and wept. Who knows what that story was all about, but it was a powerful moment, and I have to say, captured, that the food for them wasn't just sustenance, or a break from the creative intensity. It was an embrace, a warming, comforting hug, an expression of love, sharing, giving, bequeathing. A soft hand on their shoulder, a whisper in their ear, a supporting arm. I was no longer invisible, I was a part of their journey, helping in the only way I could.

Their stories now are waiting to be written, and the outpourings will be like the river entering the sea, turbulent and full of tears. But in the meantime, their week has been one of bliss, encouragement, friendships forged and more words on the page. Confusion partly clarified, doubts mended and a return to whatever does lie in store with a happy heart and a book closer to publication.

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

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

More on Harvest Festival from Rev Maggie Metcalfe:







Salisbury City Council joins countywide community air quality project

Salisbury City Council is pleased to announce the installation of two new air quality sensors, at its Tollgate Road Depot and Bemerton Heath Centre sites, as part of a Wiltshire Council-led initiative.

Wiltshire Council's Wiltshire Community Air Network (WCAN) has launched a one-year community air quality monitoring project to understand more about air pollution in Wiltshire by using low-cost PurpleAir Zen PM2.5 Air Quality sensors to measure local fine particulate matter (PM2.5) air pollution.

PM2.5 is a type of air pollution made up of tiny pieces of solids or liquids, each no larger than 2.5 micrometres. These particles can originate from both human activities, such as vehicle emissions, and natural sources, such as dust. Exposure to PM2.5 can increase the risk of health problems and have harmful effects on the environment.

There is currently limited local data about PM2.5 in Wiltshire. By hosting two sensors, Salisbury City Council is contributing to a county-wide effort to identify local PM2.5 pollution trends and hotspots and inform future strategy for air quality monitoring and pollution reduction. This work is directly in line with its own Environment Policy, which commits the City Council to working with partners to monitor and help improve air quality.

The air quality sensors provide real-time data on PM2.5 pollution levels, which members of the public will be able to access online at map.purpleair.com. Individuals and communities can use this data to learn more about their local air quality.

Cllr Paul Sample, said, "This project will help us understand more about PM2.5 air pollution in Salisbury and Wiltshire as a whole.

"Wiltshire Council have obtained 100 low-cost air quality sensors available to measure local PM2.5 air pollution. The data from the sensors will be analysed by scientists to help us understand local PM2.5 pollution trends and hotspots, as well as helping inform our future strategy for air quality monitoring.

"I'd like to thank Salisbury City Council for supporting this project. If you would like to take part, please get in touch. There are still some areas of the City where we have no data."

Knife crime and theft offences drop across Wiltshire and Swindon



Communities across Swindon and Wiltshire are seeing the results of sustained efforts to tackle crime, with new figures revealing a reduction in knife crime and theft offences over the past year.

Figures published by the Office of National Statistics show that Wiltshire has recorded a 4.5% reduction in weapon offences in the year ending June 2025 compared to the previous year—a reduction from 420 crimes to 401.

It comes following a partnership focus on delivering the Serious Violence Duty (SVD) which places a legal obligation on specified authorities to reduce violent crime. This includes police, local authorities, probation, NHS, youth justice services and fire.

Further work is now underway to build on this momentum and progress made so far, including a new initiative to replace standard kitchen knives with safer, curved-edge alternatives in homes identified as potentially being at higher risk of violence.

Schools across the county are also engaging with the Blunt Truth programme, which educates young people about the dangers of knife crime. These efforts are supported

by focused deterrence and early intervention strategies aimed at diverting young people away from violence before it escalates.

Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson said: "Tackling serious violence remains one of my top priorities, and these figures show that our collective efforts are beginning to make a difference. The reduction in weapon offences is encouraging, but we know there is still much more to do.

"Through the Serious Violence Duty, we're working closely with partners to intervene earlier, support communities, and prevent harm before it happens. Initiatives like the Blunt Truth programme in schools, the replacement of kitchen knives in high-risk homes, and our support for grassroots organisations in our local communities are all part of a wider strategy to reduce violence and protect lives. It is about prevention, not just enforcement."

Theft offences have also declined, with a 6.5% drop recorded, from 11,648 crimes to 10,896. This contrasts with the regional average, which saw a 1.9% increase over the same period. Work is ongoing to drive down retail and business crime in the county including increased patrols in retail areas, improved CCTV coverage, and collaborative work with local businesses to deter opportunistic theft and repeat offending.

Recognising that theft offences—particularly shop theft - may often go unreported, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner is preparing to launch the Business Crime Reduction Partnership (BCRP) alongside Salisbury BID, a new partnership initiative which aims to encourage more consistent reporting, improve intelligence sharing, and strengthen preventative measures across the county's retail and commercial sectors.

Mr Wilkinson added: "These latest figures are a clear sign that our approach is working. The drop in thefts—especially when compared to rising rates across the region—shows that our investment in visible policing, smarter prevention, and partnership working is delivering real results. But we know theft is often underreported, which is why our work with the BCRP and local businesses is so important in building trust and encouraging consistent reporting.

"While recent headlines have focused on overall crime rates, it's important to look deeper. The progress we're making in key areas—especially those that directly affect public safety and wellbeing—is encouraging and worth recognising. We will continue to build on this momentum and ensure Wiltshire remains a place where people feel safe and supported."

Mr Wilkinson also reiterated his call for fairer police funding, warning that continued progress could be at risk if Wiltshire does not receive its fair share of national resources.

He added: "Wiltshire continues to be one of the lowest-funded police forces in the country. If we are to maintain and build on these successes, we urgently need a fairer funding formula that reflects the true demands on our officers and communities otherwise the improvements our residents see will not be sustainable. I will continue to press government for change—because our residents deserve better."

Deputy Chief Constable Mark Cooper said: "These encouraging figures are of course welcome. We are determined to drive down violent offences and it is clear that working in partnership with other agencies is vital in terms of addressing the social and economic factors which contribute to such offending.

"In doing so, we are protecting our communities and helping to keep Wiltshire safe.

"With the support of the Police and Crime Commissioner and the clear direction set by our Chief Constable, we will continue to relentlessly bring offenders to justice as well as supporting educational and preventative initiatives.

"The trust and confidence of our communities is vital to our mission as we continue to build on this positive momentum."

Wiltshire shortchanged by national
police funding formula



As your Police and Crime Commissioner, I remain deeply concerned that the existing national police funding formula, established by Tony Blair's government is seriously disadvantaging Wiltshire Police and limiting the service that we can provide our communities. The government's central grant allocates us approximately £115 per head of population while the national average is £164.

The current police formula does not recognise the reality of policing a largely rural county, across a wide area, with diverse challenges: rural crime, county lines, cyber crime, serious violence, mental health, victim support, and more. Without stable, fair and long-term commitments to funding, we are pushed into short-term fixes that slow innovation and jeopardise technology investment.

I have written to the previous and current police ministers and home secretaries asking them to address the disparities in police funding. Both the previous government and this one may appear annually to allocate the police more money, but in fact they do not cover inflationary pressures and increasingly expect PCCs to increase local taxes to compensate for this reduction in central funding - placing the burden on residents.

Over the last year Wiltshire Police has squeezed out just about every possible cost efficiency through their Financial Review Programme — cutting estate and fleet costs, departmental staffing reviews and tightening procurement. But there is only so much that can be trimmed before it begins harming the core service.

We also face a workforce challenge: bringing in new officers is important, but retaining experience, investing in training, and giving officers the tools they need is critical.

I applaud the progress Wiltshire Police has made under Chief Constable Catherine Roper — being removed from 'special measures' and achieving service improvements locally. Residents are telling me that they feel safer, yet none of that is guaranteed unless our funding is fair and sustainable.

This is not about balance sheets — it is about service. An outdated and unfair funding formula means slower responses, fewer officers visible in our communities, overworked teams, and delayed investigations. Wiltshire residents deserve policing that delivers and keeps them safe and that is what I am fighting for.

I will continue to campaign for multi-year settlements and reform of the funding formula to reflect the true demands of modern policing. I'm committed to ensuring that Wiltshire has the resources it needs to be safe and well served.
