Rural Assets

All rural Estates are based on sound principles of property management. With generational and commercial change, different market trends and statutory undertakings brings additional requirements. The desire however for maintenance and enhancement is key to safeguard the value of assets which must be at the heart of any core property business. A let Estate creates rent which are key to stability and generates funds which are recycled into the fabric of the business.

A 'Let Estate' in a rural context includes Agricultural, Residential and Commercial properties. Here at Longford the Agricultural property portfolio is split 1/3 in hand, 1/3 partnership and 1/3 occupied on tenancy arrangements. This is seen as a very balanced portfolio limiting exposure as well as having a spread of in hand and partnership enterprises from arable, fish, pigs, milk and beef. Our farm occupiers too have a spread of enterprises and the families have in the main been in occupation for generations which allows continuity.

The spread of residential property across the Estate is 'pepper potted'. In recent years a strong rental market has grown but this has not always been the case. Cottages in the past were constructed to support and house rural workers. With the advent of farm mechanisation coupled with the war years there was a reduced labour force in the countryside. There was a desire for land whereby the commodity made money, bricks and mortar did not and maintenance became a headache, so much so that a lot of outlying residential property was knocked down which was commonplace on most landholdings. The Estate still retains in the region of 200 dwellings of which 35% remain occupied by staff which shows the pastoral care that is offered which is amazing in this day and age. More residential property however comes to the market each year and a full repair and enhancement programme is carried out to achieve market rents. Rents continue to rise as London comes ever closer and this is a trend that I do not believe will alter given the desirability of the villages surrounding Salisbury.

Other property Lets are loosely described as commercial. Here at Longford the Trustees have not invested heavily in this sector and therefore, although we do have some offices, the majority of buildings that are occupied by third parties are either for storage or workshops.

Like all property management, regulation continues to play its part and it is important that requirements are met. We have a responsibility for over 50 Listed properties so conservation plays a major part in any decision making. Energy Performance is now very much in the forefront of political and personal agendas and we aim to meet the regulation through a common sense approach. A Landlord's liability for services and infrastructure also plays a major role and it is important and we take our responsibility seriously. Marcus Hall and his team are dedicated to property repair and enhancement, whether it is Agricultural, Residential or Commercial property and over the last four years Marcus has worked tirelessly to achieve the required standards.
